

Major Awards

Charles Christensen Memorial Award for Junior Member Of The Year - Scarlett Levy

Scarlett was born in the desert, near Abu Dhabi, where trips to the beach were rare and the idea of women participating in lifesaving activities unheard of! When the family moved back to Australia Scarlett found the exposed surf beaches of Sydney quite intimidating, but being the strong young woman that she is, decided to overcome her fear and join North Bondi Nippers in U13s.

Given her background and lack of experience in the surf, Scarlett initially found Nippers quite scary, especially when competing at Club Champs against girls who had been in Nippers since the age of five. Despite her initial fears of the surf, Scarlett achieved her SRC where her trainers found her to be an excellent student. Having fully embraced the lifesaving aspects of the program Scarlett discovered a passion for the surf, public service and helping others, rapidly undertaking advanced awards Provide First Aid and Advanced Resuscitation.

By the time Scarlett completed her second year of patrolling, she held her SRC, Provide First Aid, and ART accreditations and had helped train two SRC courses, while helping age manage her younger brother Max's U10 age group.

Scarlett is also a member of the Sydney Branch Youth and Junior Development Committee and is a Youth facilitator.

Scarlett is a true role model for both women and youth and a worthy recipient of the Junior Member of the Year award.

Stan McDonald Memorial Award for the Most Outstanding Club Official - Alex Goold

Alex has been involved with North Bondi Nippers for eight years, starting as the Age Manager for his son, Flynn's, nipper group. In this time, Alex has dedicated many hours to the Nipper Program - three years as Nipper beach coach and four years on the Nippers Executive Committee. For the past two years, Alex has been the Nipper President.

He completed his Bronze Medallion in 2022 and assists with Nipper water safety as well as being a keen patroller. More recently, Alex also started helping to train the SRCs.

The Nipper Competition Team has excelled in recent seasons, with the Club winning back-to-back State Championships. Alex has had a

key hand in this success, providing assistance in many aspects of Nipper competition. The Branch Youth Championships have been hosted by the Club in the past two seasons which have been a highlight for the Nipper section. The amount of work put in by Alex to allow the Club to host these carnivals has been immeasurable and the success is largely due to his leadership and drive.

The Nipper section is an area of strength at the Club and the team Alex has created to run Sunday Nippers is well-placed to continue and develop future lifesavers.

Alex is a proactive member and happy to help with basically anything that needs to be done. He is a deserving recipient of the Most Outstanding Club Official award.

The Patron's Award for the Most Outstanding Club Member -Peter Skinner

Peter is an unsung hero of North Bondi who always puts his hand up for the thankless tasks that nobody else wants to do, as he knows that the completion of these tasks will make the Club a better place for everyone else, particularly our Youth and Open competitors. This season alone, Pete has taken trailer loads of various craft to and from the craft repair shop and helped out with on-site minor repairs and re-cabling skis. He has set up, supervised, packed down and cleaned out the ice bath for competitors, and towed trailers all over the state and country.

He made at least five return trips to Queensland with the Club bus and trailer this season, including two return trips in the week of Aussies. In addition to trips to Queensland for various carnivals, Peter has also towed trailers to many local carnivals and various downwind training sessions for the ski squad – and on some occasions has turned up to tow trailers on days where neither himself or his son Tim were even competing. His efforts don't stop at simply towing the trailers – Peter also oversees the loading, unloading and logistics of getting the trailers to and from their off-site location, and he is always the first to arrive and last to leave a carnival.

Outside of the assistance he provides to the surf sports section, Peter is a Long Service member who still performed over 40 patrol hours during the season – with 100% patrol attendance for Patrol 5, of which he is a Patrol Vice Captain. In addition to his allocated patrol duties, he voluntarily captained the patrol on Christmas morning – giving up his

time on Christmas Day. Peter is also a regular biathlon and surf race participant and can often be found at Friday and Sunday drinks.

Members like Peter often go unrecognised so it's pleasing to be able to recognise his efforts and award him The Patron's Award for the Most Outstanding Club Member.

Maintenance and Council Liaison Efforts

Raille Galgut has been vigilant in overseeing our IRB operations while also managing to coordinate with the council to ensure our clubhouse remains well-maintained. This dual focus has been instrumental in keeping our facilities in top condition for all members and visitors.

Education and Skill Development

Anna Willis, our Head of Education, along with her team, have excelled in their efforts to enhance the skills of our senior members. They have also been pivotal in securing the Club's future by guiding over 130 SRCs and junior Bronze members as they transition to the senior club.



Event Management and Adaptability

Patron's Report

How Bluey Became a Boatie

Steve Larnach, our President, has filled various positions on the executive, become a Wally Weekes donor and has been made a Life Member. However, we all know that Bluey has become the quintessential Boatie.

Over the years, since the age of sixteen, he has rowed and swept in many crews and has become the longest serving boat rower in our Club's history – a total of forty-four years. He has never competed for any other club, unlike various other North Bondi rowers. His first season was very tough and enough to discourage anyone from wanting to continue in what is probably the riskiest form of surf sports.

Steve was brought up by a single mother with his two sisters and one brother in the church rectory attached to the Bondi Anglican Church on the corner of Wairoa Avenue and Ramsgate Avenue. I think it's fair to say they were not rich. Bluey joined North Bondi in 1980. He was part of a group of boys who were pupils or ex-pupils of the then Dover Heights Boys' High School, now Rose Bay Secondary College. I can mention Grant McMah, Henry Rolley, Peter Zieme, Geoff Kingston, Doug Kingston, Bruce Pinkerton, Ben Griffiths and Mathew Page as members of that group. All went on to become Boaties at North Bondi.

In 1978, my last year as President, there were no boat crews and only one hundred and eleven active members. The cause was clear. For the preceding two years the Clubhouse was a building site with the new upper floor completed in 1979. That year, I stepped down and Gary Shiels took over as President.

In 1980-81, I became Boat Captain with Paul Cunningham as Vice-captain. I started a junior crew from scratch. Steve's fellow Bronzies, forty-nine in number, included Ben Griffiths, Scott Thomson, Bill Gill and Peter Colquhoun. It should be noted that that year saw the first thirteen female Bronzies, including Jenny Anderson and Gaye Rosen.

I recruited Steve, Ben, Anthony Picone and Matt Page to row as a first-year junior crew, starting early in the season. I had had three seasons as a sweep in which I had gained experience in all aspects of boat rowing, including how to recover boats and oars after we went "down the mine". I wasn't one of the greats. My asset was that as a swimmer and wave-ski paddler, I could read the surf. In 1980-81 that was to prove vital.

Paul Cunningham swept the senior crew of Steve Bambach, Peter Zieme, Henry Rolley and Bob Wheatley. Other members who filled in when needed were Club Captain Grant McMah and Paul Lloyd.

The junior crew was somewhat underweight as became apparent whenever it was necessary to lift the boats. The first Johnny Walker boat, a beautiful but overweight plywood craft, required at least eight men to lift it. The new fiberglass Johnny Walker boat was much more manageable, but our crew still struggled. If the senior crew was away at carnivals, we had to rely on men from

other clubs to help out. The Coogee crews, under John Lemarseny often stepped in. John became a good friend to us and helped greatly with training and rowing tips.

I was concerned that the crew was too light to handle big seas, but the fact was that this enabled us to handle heavy seas. The fiberglass Johnny Walker boat simply bobbed up and over the white water (provided we got the timing right).

We needed to be a good crew because that year the sea conditions were unusually heavy. The State Championships in 1981 were held at Evans Head on the North Coast. The junior races should have been called off because a cyclone produced a huge swell. There were several breaks, so the turning buoys had to be set a long way out; sets sometimes broke outside them.

The races went ahead. We were in the second heat on the red peg. The Copacabana crew, swept by Big Daryl Eastlake, the famous rugby league commentator, was the first to go. There was a three-foot break, a fiftymetre channel, then a bank with a high surge of white water and then the main break, pumping up to a six- to eight-foot face. Eastlake's juniors got a good start then hit the white water on the bank, which caused them to backshoot. Eastlake was thrown forward, his sweep oar struck him across the back of his neck and knocked him into the water, where he sank out of sight in the foam. Panic ensued! Multiple swimmers ran in and after what seemed an eternity, pulled



him to the surface. Eastlake was paralyzed. They rushed him up the beach right in front of our crew.

The next heat, ours, was postponed until a helicopter landed and flew Eastlake to hospital in Brisbane. The crews were obviously shaken by Eastlake's injury and were offered the chance to pull out. The offer was discussed at a meeting of the sweeps, and it was obvious that their rowers did not want to be seen as "dogging it" and decided to continue.

We crept out while other crews were swamped, adopting a "wait and see" approach until we got over a number of big waves and popped out into blue water, which was really brown water from the flooded Evans River. Now we had to get back. We rowed about twenty metres past our can, then as we turned I looked out to sea and saw a tree "growing" out of the ocean. It was actually a branch washed down from the river. It had a lot of leaves and had been lifted up by a very big swell. The swell developed into a large wave which was going to smash us. The only option was to go for it or push back to try and avoid it. I had no real choice. It was going to clean us up one way





or another, so we went for it – three strokes and a "come aft". The twenty-five-foot boat bounced a couple of times down the face of the wave, then we went straight for about fifty metres before about 2 metres of white water smashed into us. I lost it and the boat took off under the lip of the wave for about thirty metres before we rolled and sank.

No one was hurt but we were exhausted by the recovery of the boat and oars. In fact, we were quite pleased being eliminated and not having to go out again.

In later years, these risks became tragically real. On the 31st of March 1996, two junior boats collided. Robert Gatenby, a first-year junior, was knocked unconscious, sank and drowned. His body was not found until three days later. This event and the drowning of ironman Saxon Bird in 2010 focused the attention of the public and SLSA of the need to cancel surf events if the conditions become too dangerous.

I have no doubt that the Evans Head races should have been cancelled by the officials rather than forcing sixteen-year-olds into choosing between backing out or risking injury.

At the Australians at Wanda, we again faced a very big sea. This time, we had several races, managing to get out and back in each time. We even won a heat and progressed to the quarter finals. I held a very heavy wave which I remember to this day. In the quarter finals we drew the "bad alley" and came in

fourth. Coogee juniors progressed to the final and won the Bronze. I was reminded of this in 2022 when I met the Coogee crew members, who also had fond memories of that day. Our crew of sixteen-year-olds was in the top sixteen of the almost one hundred crews who competed at Wanda, a performance which was equaled the following year at the Aussies held at Moana, South Australia.

The 1980-81 crew were keen participants in fund raising, such as the Volvo Viking Boat Race around Shark Island, which resulted in a thousand-dollar donation to the Club. Two rowers from that crew, Picone and Larnach, had one-hundred-percent patrol attendance.

The Lady Berryman Trophy was awarded each season for the most outstanding Junior. Steve won that award, described in the Annual Report citation as follows: "Steve Larnach, a popular figure around the Club, rowed in the Junior Boat Crew, in addition to completing all his rostered patrols. He participated in many Club events and is always willing to lend a hand."

It was a dramatic start to a long and fruitful career. The words of the citation have held true for forty-four years.

The 2023/24 season was a vivid reminder of life pre pandemic. With a string of very hot, sunny days, the beach was heaving with swimmers, resulting in lots of rescues, first aids and preventative actions. I'm proud to say that we managed the crowds exceptionally well and no lives were lost.

We are constantly working to balance the needs of the patrol roster with member engagement. We've reduced the minimum patrol hours to 30 and, through a great Youth engagement initiative, introduced a 15-hour minimum for members in their final year of high school. While we should never aim to do only the minimum, we have found a good balance for everyone and will continue to review these trade-offs.

In response to a close call during patrol, we have reintroduced EpiPens to our patrol first aid kits. Special thanks to Sarah Luff for organising a dedicated storage system for them and providing detailed instructions on their use. This initiative enhances our patrolling members' lifesaving capabilities significantly.

Two members of our patrolling team performed out-of-hours rescues and were nominated for Branch Rescue of the Month. Courtney Levin executed a fantastic rescue at Bronte Beach and Jade Melvey-Lester was part of an IRB mass rescue out of hours during training at Bondi Beach. Both patrollers used their skills to save lives, making themselves and our club proud in the process.

This year we were asked to help the North Bondi RSL Club on ANZAC Day by providing qualified members to run the first aid tent during the dawn service, a fantastic initiative that we were only too happy to support. Thankfully our services were not needed on the day but we are hoping to make this great cause a regular fixture on the patrolling calendar.

The Club didn't perform any outreach patrols this season because Garie Beach remains closed following heavy flooding over the last couple of seasons. Patrolling Garie is hugely popular so we are hopeful the beach opens next year.

Again, the Club ran two successful club swims. First up was the BSc Bergs to Buckler in December, followed by the Oceana North Bondi Classic which was postponed until April due to weather and surf conditions. Both swims were well supported despite the tricky conditions.



Hosting these events would not be possible without the tireless efforts of our dedicated volunteers who work together to make these days successful. A big thank you to everyone who participated in water safety; your contributions are critical to the safety and success of these events.

A huge thank you to the IRB section, which fielded six boats each day to support the swims. Special thanks to Anthony Berman, Raille Galgut, Mike Galgut, Damian Barden, Lex Merkur, and all the IRB drivers and crew who contributed to the success on the water. Additionally, huge gratitude to Jane Cichero, Michael Nearhos, and the rest of the medical team, whose efforts were integral to the events' success on land.

There are many people who keep our season running and on track. I would like to thank Rebecca Penn and Adam Thorp for their ongoing support as Club Vice Captains, Anthony Berman for running the IRB section, Sarah Luff for keeping our first aid room fully kitted out and Stewart Bailey for running the annual gear inspection and performing continual maintenance during the year.

Most importantly, a huge thanks to the Patrol Captains and Vice Captains who dedicate so much time and effort to managing their patrols and the beach each week. These hardworking members do a lot of behind-thescenes work to ensure we can provide a safe beach environment for everyone to enjoy. Thank you all, and well done.



Surf Sports Report

Well, season 2023/24 has come and gone. Unlike many recent seasons, this year we saw a largely uninterrupted series of carnivals and events giving our athletes a good opportunity to unleash all their skills and training they put in over many months.

North Bondi is one of the very few clubs in Australia where we invest in all aspects of competition. It is something for the whole club to be proud of, to see athletes from North Bondi representing the red, white and chocolate in Nippers, Opens and Masters at carnivals all around the country.

We kicked the season off with some of our Opens and Masters doing the Coolangatta Gold (see dedicated section for more details). Competitors put in the hard yards, training over the cold and lonely winter months. North Bondi is regularly one of the largest represented clubs up there, enjoying some warmer weather, great competition and a little celebrating too I understand!

One of the earliest wins of the season was the amazing result of our Men's Open boat crew winning Gold at the Aussie Short Course Championship. More about that in the boat section report.

This year we were lucky to see almost all carnivals proceed and had some great surf conditions at many events. North Bondi again hosted the Shaw and Partners Summer of Surf which saw some big surf and challenging conditions. Our athletes don't get a chance to race against the best in front of their own club, so hosting this event (although a bit of work), is a highlight of the season.

The competition squad hit the road this year with our gear trailer (and highly honoured driver – Pete Skinner) racking up over 10,000kms venturing up to Queensland five times, northern NSW and around Sydney often.

Our Masters squad was awarded the State Championship in March capping off another great season here in NSW. The large crew of men and women, with a 40+ year age spread, did us proud in the water, on the water, on the sand and even on surf boards.

We had our new Head Coach start in 2023/24. His CV reads impeccably, being a Life Member, Olympian, former ironman and current Open ski paddler. Jim Walker hit the ground running in June of 2023 getting our athletes stronger over the winter months with the help of Jake Michael setting some tough workouts. There was lots of variety and great feedback from the competitors which was evidenced by the large squads and strong team representation in most age groups.

In addition to individual results, a highlight for me was seeing so many North Bondi competitors racing Opens. We had both men's and Women's Open teams in most disciplines and peaked with four Open Men's board and ski relay teams. With athletes as young as 14 competing up on the Sunshine Coast for Aussies, the future looks very bright indeed.

Planning is already under way for season 2024/25 and I'm excited to see what lays

Finally, I'd like to say a big thank you to our generous sponsors, coaches, officials, trailer drivers, Merchandise Team, IRB drivers and crew, tent carriers, age managers, and everyone else who played a part. Without all of you, there would be no chance any of us would be on the sand competing.

Head Coach Report

This year the surf sports team embarked on a new journey, embracing change and new direction. Under the guidance of a unified coach for board, ski, and iron disciplines, the team set out with a dual purpose: honing skills for sustained success in senior competition while nurturing the emerging talent of Youth athletes.

The season started in June, where members of the team across all age groups attended twice-weekly gym sessions. We were fortunate enough to benefit from Jake Michael's expertise in strength and conditioning – Jake set a variety of programs for the group, accounting for different skill and experience levels, and organised testing activities so each athlete could see the progress they were making. These gym sessions were regularly followed by group running sessions – which took us on a whole variety of different routes around the Bondi area. Our early season gym and running activities allowed us not only to build our fitness and strength, but to get to know each other off the water and build relationships and camaraderie amongst our training group.

As the weather warmed up and we started to move our training back into the water, one of the focuses for the athletes was to practice racing and putting themselves under race conditions. In August we hosted our friends from South Maroubra SLSC, North Curl Curl SLSC and North Cronulla SLSC for a practice carnival, where all attendees got to test themselves with some social racing followed by a BBQ. Over the October long weekend, a number of our competitors also travelled to Swansea and participated in a combined training camp with Swansea-Belmont SLSC members, giving our athletes the opportunity to further develop their skills in conditions

that were different to Bondi and to build relationships with members of other clubs. Throughout the season we talked a lot about how important it is to build friendships with members of other clubs – although there is naturally rivalry in any race, these friendships with other members of our movement will be remembered for much longer than any race result. On this note, we were also fortunate enough to be visited by three former Australian champions and Life Members of Mooloolaba SLSC, who spoke to us about their training, racing and mindset – and what having a lifelong involvement with their surf club has meant to them.

As we approached summer the team quickly adapted to a high intensity training regimen, setting the stage for success. Although there were fewer carnivals this season than in previous years, there was an intense level of competition and North Bondi competitors did themselves proud at a number of local and interstate carnivals. We were represented at all four 10,000-point rounds of the Shaw and Partners Summer of Surf – with the extra special opportunity for our competitors to race on their home beach in February at the Shaw and Partners Summer of Surf North Bondi Classic. We were also well represented at the Coolangatta Gold, the Nutri Grain Next Gen Series and Branch, State and Aussies carnivals.

With many of these major carnivals taking place in Queensland this required extensive travel and craft transport logistics. Our ability to take part in these carnivals was made possible by the unwavering dedication of Peter Skinner, who tirelessly towed the trailer to countless local and interstate carnivals, including multiple return journeys to Queensland. We cannot thank him enough











for his contributions to getting our craft where it needed to be all season.

When it came to our major carnivals for the season – SLSNSW State Championships and SLSA Australian Championships – both the Open and Youth divisions delivered standout results in some tricky conditions. Despite the formidable surf conditions at Aussies in Maroochydore, the team rose to the challenge and showcased exceptional skill and resilience.

Looking forward - in the 2024/25 season we hope to build on the success of this season, and for our younger team members to continue to develop their skills as they grow through the ranks of Open racing. However, the success of our surf sports program would not be possible without the unwavering support of Shaw and Partners Financial Services, Earl Evans, Allan Zion, Race One Surfcraft, and Gary and Vicky Shiels. From the combined donations of Gary and Vicky Shiels and Race One Surfcraft the Club was able to purchase 11 new race mals at the commencement of this season, which were allocated out to our board paddlers and enabled them to compete at the highest level this season. On behalf of the recipients of these race mals we would like to thank these donors once again for their generosity, which is instrumental in sustaining our surf sports program and ensuring a bright future for our team.

Our team will have a well-deserved break over the winter months, but I am looking forward to working with them again and seeing their continued success in the 2024/25 season.

I'd like to highlight a standout performance by 'Kroney' who took a risk and confidently led the entire 2km race until the final 150m. It was an extremely gutsy performance to push that hard from the start and very inspirational to watch!

Moving on to the Youth and Open Championships, we had a small but mighty team representing North Bondi. Coming off their first full season of preparation, Sophia Garvin, Tippi Wieland and Zoe Tindale proved they are ones to watch, with strong results from all three. Sophia placed 5th in the U/15 final, Tippi and Zoe secured a 5th place in the U/17 2 x 1km relay. They also all took away invaluable experience and said they are hungry for more next season!

In the Open category, Sophie Ferenczi, coming off her water competition, showcased her resilience with a strong 5th place finish. I finally achieved my childhood dream and took home my first Gold in the Open 2km race. In the Open 2 x 1km relay, Sophie and I defended our title for the fourth consecutive year, creating a very special moment for us and the Club.

Looking ahead, I am driven and excited to grow our presence and achieve results in the Masters, Opens and Youth categories. I also look forward to continuing to mentor and encourage our little future soft sand runners in Nippers. Overall, we are all very happy with our efforts, with the strength of the North Bondi Boatie section and with what was a very enjoyable season.

Another highlight was the christening of our new boat the Grant "Grandma" McMah, courtesy of our unwavering sponsor Shaw and Partners. It was a fantastic day having the 1987 Junior crew of Grant, Henry Rolley, Steve Bamback and Peter Zieme with Steve Larnach filling in for Paul Wingnuts Cunningham (RIP) rowing the boat out and catching a wave in showing form and grace not seen at North Bondi for many years.

In closing I would like to thank Shaw and Partners for their continued support and generosity, the backing and support of the North Bondi Board of Management, Peter Zieme for standing on the tower in the rain and officiating for us and Tina Ekins for doing all our entries.

The Masters Competition at the Australian Championships was red hot this year, with at least 30% more participants than had ever been seen before. We had almost 60 Masters competing - our highest number ever. Most competitors went through semi-finals and even quarter-finals of their individual events. In the women's Taplin, it was the first time that heats had been held, which shows the growth and popularity of the sport.

North Bondi's main success came on the sand, led by our Beach Sprinters. Dean Scarff (35-39) and Ross Langbein (40-44) both winning Gold, Joel Maybury (50-54) Silver, and Freya Riddel (30-34) and Gill Worden (45-49) Bronze. We had 6 Beach Relays with 5 of them making finals. Two sensational Silver medals - 140+ Kaylie McDougal, Chrissy Maybury, Megan Rumford and Freya Riddel combined, while in the 200+ Gillian Worden, Michelle Baker-Barden, Michael Segaert (who pulled her hamstring mid-race) and Steph Hughes put together an awesome team performance! North Bondi had never won the 170 Beach Relay and in fact, champion Coach, Joel had never won a

Beach Relay at Aussies. This all changed when Ross, Dean and Joel combined to give Talbot Henry an unassailable lead to bring home the glory. The next day Dean, Ross and Joel won Gold in their Beach Flags events. Dean and Ross deservedly shared the Bill Gill award for the "Masters Competitor of the Year".

We had fantastic results in the longer sand runs too. Gary Shiels became North Bondi's oldest Gold Medallist at Aussies in the 75+ 1km Soft Sand run. In sweltering conditions, we then won a further 5 individual Silver medals through Brendan Krone (50-54), Gerry Robb (45-49), Chrissy Maybury (45-49), Miriam Salter (35-39) and Freya Riddel (30-34). This was Miriam's first individual medal at Aussies reward the work she puts in across her events. Great runs for Bronze too by Michelle Baker-Barden (55-59) and Josh Stein (35-39).

In the water, a big shout out to our oldest female competitor Jane Cichero (60-64) who won a Bronze in the toughest event on the program – the Ironwoman! Jane also formed the nucleus of the women's 170 teams, which we fielded for the very first time, showcasing the dedication and improvement of our female athletes. Speaking of which, a highlight of the carnival was victory in the Double Ski (30-34) for Megan Rumford and Lulu Wise. This is the Club's first-ever female Gold Medal in Double Ski. Lulu also claimed Silver in her single ski and with her great results at Branch and NSW Championships was awarded the North Bondi Female Most Outstanding Competitor of the Year.

In the 150 Surf Teams, North Bondi fielded 4 teams of which 3 made it through to the final, where Matt Hamilton, Simon Storry and Talbot finished in the top end to win Silver. Down the beach in the 110 area, Matt Jenkins combined with Jake and Luke Michael for Silver in the Ski Relay. There was more success in the 45-49 Double Ski with Andre Dalton and Jim Walker striking Gold.

Finally, in the very last race Andre was in a team with Matt and Simon in the 150 Taplin. Australian Champions like Sean Davis, Matt Poole and Pierce Leonard lined up for the Swim which was to be followed by Board and Ski. The swell was up and Simon was in the water first, cracking one of the waves of the day, which he held from the cans all the way to the beach to tag Hamo in 2nd place. Andre went into the final ski leg behind but was coming home strong when a huge wave formed. He put in the hard yards and flew down it. The beach was yelling out "paddle, paddle", but Andre stayed calm and kept his ski straight to drive North Bondi to a famous victory.

With a couple more medals in the Surfing to Amy Hanna (30-39) and Steph Hughes (50-59) we ended up with our highest-ever point-score at Aussies. This also resulted in us securing our first-ever 3rd placing behind Bondi and host club Mooloolaba.

None of this could've been achieved without a mountain of work behind the scenes. Big thank you to all who volunteered their time as coaches – Jake [Ski], Talbot, Luke Harris, Hugo Dudley-Smith and Kiva Galgut [Swim], Rique [Running], and Miriam [Board]. We literally couldn't compete at Carnivals if it wasn't for our officials – thanks to Tina Ekins, Lindy and Guy Beynon, Annette Dydula, Narelle Clark and Mary-Jane Tier. Finally, a big thank you to trailer drivers Josh Stein, Pete Skinner, Jake Clifton and Paul Wilkinson.

Time for a very short break now before getting back into the swing of things for the World Championships on the Gold Coast in August, closely followed by the 40th anniversary of the Coolangatta Gold in October. Can't wait to see what we can achieve in 2024/25.

Coolangatta Gold 2023

North Bondi had a large group head to the Gold Coast to take on the various Coolangatta Gold courses - 6 long course competitors, 5 short course competitors, 3 competitors in the downwind ski paddle and one nipper in the Youth race.

Five club athletes lined up for the Coolie short course event. The 'short course' is actually bloody long but short at least when compared with what those courageous long course animals did on the Sunday (more on that below).



Coolangatta Gold Short Course

The short course competitors were led by perennial club super athlete and Coolie Gold stalwart, Simon "Stoz" Storry, who was coming off an age group victory in the 2022 long course. Joining him was seventime Coolie short course veteran Jake, "The Assassin" Clifton, and me, Dave "Marto" Martin, also backing up from 2022. We had returned for more to compete in the 50-59 age division.

In the female division, the Club was represented by Patrol Captain and super swimmer Eloise Starr and Masters rookie, Elise McKay. Coolangatta Gold debuts for both girls. What's more remarkable is that Eloise and Elise had only learned to ski six months prior to the race, and more impressively, Elise got her Bronze Medallion last season so the closest she'd been to ocean craft before the race, was seeing boogie boards in shop windows.

Coming into race day, the outlook was varied. Stoz had trained well but was suffering from a serious case of man flu and hadn't trained in the week leading up to the big event. Jake on the other hand was feeling confident. Eloise looked strong, and both girls showed incredible tenacity, persisting through some arduous seagoing training sessions with lots of unplanned time spent in the drink.

As for me, after getting sorted on the sand last year by my Coolie/Masters/general good guy inspiration, Hugo Dudley-Smith, I had a little more run training under my belt, but was a bit undercooked for all things water. So I dedicated my training regimen to studying re-runs of the 1984 Coolangatta Gold movie and used it to support my elite training preparation.

Race day presented perfect conditions for the short course crew. A 10.5km ski paddle, 2km swim, and a 3km board paddle, followed by a gruelling, calf busting 5.5km sand run to the finish. Resident club amateur sports psychologist, Stew "Harden Up" O'Regan, gave some solid last-minute advice before the start line: "Remember team, second place is for losers." And with that, we were off.

Our two rookie girls delivered excellent performances, starting with solid ski times. Eloise came second with a great swim and in a fast time of 3 hours and 2 mins (40-49 female age group) and Elise placed 4th in the 30-39 female division with a credible time of 3 hours 12 mins.

In the boys, Stoz asked his body what it had hidden in the tank - and he didn't die wondering. He started the ski leg at blistering pace, leading the highly competitive 50-59 age group, which had 26 competitors and the largest field of the race. Stoz battled hard throughout, and despite being out of sorts, finished a credible 9th (2 hours 46 minutes) in a tough field. Jake messed his start on the ski, missing the big advantages of the drag of the front groups, but his fitness and assassin-like focus paid off and he worked his way back through the strong field. His performance was bolstered by a blistering front half of his run, ultimately finishing 7th in 2 hours 43 minutes - and beating last year's winner! Flat conditions helped me have a great ski paddle and I was able to catch a sick Stoz late in the board leg. Seeing a flying Jake on the run turn, I took it up a notch and I managed to squeeze in 4th place by a shoulder and near heart attack, finishing in 2 hours 41 minutes.

Overall, in the most competitive category for the short course, we had three finish in the top 10, out of 26 finishers!

Standing in the recovery arena, I was able to pass on some Masters tips to Youth U12 competitor Bart Carmody who was preparing for his race and came in 8th in his division.

Coolangatta Gold Long Course

The Coolangatta Gold Sunday races saw six competitors take on the long course - our two elite Open Men, Tim Senior-Skinner and Seb Fergusson, and Masters, Stew O'Regan, Megan Rumford, Sarah Davies and Miriam Salter. It was also the first time we had three Masters women completing in the long course.

It was a scorching day, with small swell and increasing winds during the swim leg. To make matters worse, the long course was unexpectedly extended! 23km ski, 1km sand run, a 3.5km swim that actually measured 4.3km (how SLSA managed to get the course set that wrong is still beyond us), 6.1km board paddle and an 8.2km sand run finish, in the heat. The ground was so hot it was causing third-degree burns on the feet of some competitors who chose not to run in shoes.

Tim and Seb did well taking out 14th and 16th places respectively in the Elite male category. Unfortunately, Tim paid the price with his decision to run barefoot. Stu picked up a 3rd in his 40-49 year age group, Sarah and Miriam won Silver in the 30-39 and 50-59 female category and Megan achieved a third place podium finish in the 30-39 age group.





Downwind Paddle

There is something for everyone at the Coolangatta Gold, and for those who are not keen on the swim, run and board, also on the schedule is a 14km 'downwind paddle' race. Due to the lack of wind, the course ended up being a large 'out and back' triangle, off Coolangatta Beach (at least this gave our trailer drivers a well-earned break). Our three competitors in this event also put in some outstanding performances – Jim Walker 2nd, 50-59 male (11th overall male), Paul Christensen 7th, 50-59 male, and Scott Averay 14th, 40-49 male.

So what's the take away from the Coolangatta Gold? The short course is a fun and brutal day out but definitely highly rewarding. The long course is a challenging race and to finish it is an achievement in itself. It was inspiring to see so many of our club athletes train through the winter and travel to the Goldie to take on these races.

The 'Coolangatta Gold' festival' has a great vibe and members, from old school to rookies, should have a crack - especially for the big 40th anniversary event in 2024. I can assure you, there will be a big North Bondi crew there – it will be epic and you will regret it if you miss it. I highly recommend everyone starts watching the 1994 film classic, The Coolangatta Gold re-runs as part of their off season training.

Lastly a quick thanks to Peter Skinner and Stew O'Regan for getting our kit there, to the long course heroes who make everything else seem doable with their incredible feats, to the great club crew who make it so fun to train with, and finally to the Club for its ongoing support of competition that's very much part of the soul of all things awesome at North Bondi.

If in doubt, have a go. See you on the start line in 2024.




































Nipper Report

Nippers plays a vital role in helping children stay safe in the water, but the program also embodies values of teamwork, leadership, and community service. Our valued, long-term major Nipper sponsor, Ric Serrao from Raine & Horne Double Bay/Bondi Beach summed this up at our end of season presentation when he said it was the reason for his continued support.

North Bondi welcomed 112 new U6 Nippers to the program and we hope they continue to move through the age groups and follow the pathway to community service through lifesaving patrols.

We also said goodbye to our U14 Nippers, all 63 of them graduating with their Surf Rescue Certificate (SRC). At presentation day, we awarded two outstanding Nippers, Ruby Cregan and Flynn Goold as Male and Female 'Nipper of the Year'.

Sydney Branch again hosted the U11 and U13 Development Camps. A number of our Nippers joined other clubs for a weekend away and by all accounts, had a great time.

One of the oldest carnivals on the calendar is the Waverley Shield and North Bondi emerged victorious over local clubs, Bronte, Bondi and Tamarama. Severe surf conditions prevented the water events going ahead at the Sydney Branch Carnival which was hosted by the Club, which left our beachies to represent the Club and they produced some fantastic results.

The opportunities at Sunday Nippers are as diverse as the people drawn to it and being a voluntary organisation, there's a role for everyone. Many of you may know Rob Carmody; he's the water safety captain for Sunday Nippers and responsible for risk assessments, layout of the water activity areas and the correct ratio of water safety personnel to children. It's a massive commitment and every Sunday he's in the water or walking the sand, overseeing safety, and encouraging Nippers with their swims, wades and boards. Rob is well deserving of the 'Debbie Holland Award' for Service to Nippers. He acknowledges he's ably supported by Adam Harley and David Martin and the set-up crew of Steve Wales, Ric Arms, Michael Cunningham, Gene Ross and new recruit, Sam Gowland.

At presentation day, we awarded our 'Competitors of the Year'. Congratulations to U10 water competitor, Emerson Hoo, and U12 beach competitor, Amber Worden. Both had an outstanding season. Emerson won three Gold medals and one Silver at State and Amber won Gold, Silver and Bronze medals in every event she competed in.

I also want to make special mention of the U13 Male Beach Relay team. Aside from minor substitutions over the years, this group of boys has won the event at state since U9. Congratulations, Connor Colquhoun, Spencer Parker-Booth, Jensen Lee and Joshua Raymond for making it five in a row.

And what a remarkable conclusion to our season, North Bondi winning the All-Age Board Relay for a second year in a row! Decked out in their North Bondi State uniforms put together by Mel Hamilton, the Club clinched the overall Age Championship Point Score to take out the NSW State Title. It marks North Bondi's second win in club history, having won the championship last year.

As I said at the Club celebrations, it takes a team to win a championship, and while not all competitors walked away with a medal, each one left with the spirit of a champion.

Youth Report

Well, we thought last year was spectacular, but I would have to say this year has been even better. North Bondi Youth enjoyed many successes and set new benchmarks in the 2023/24 season.

Firstly, our club was crowned Age Champions at the State Titles for the second year in a row. "Back-to-back, Baby!" What a huge achievement from our beach and water competitors! We won 18 Gold medals and once again, the results were shared evenly between the beach and water teams. It's a testament to the coaching of Joel Maybury and Fred Carmody whose reports will follow. For the record, North Bondi finished first with 274 points, followed by Coogee with 233 and South Maroubra with 221 points. A complete list of medallists can be found later in this Report.

In an impressive display of consistency and skill, the Club secured the Waverley Shield for the eighth consecutive year, marking another remarkable achievement for the Club. Unfortunately, the Branch Championships water events were cancelled due to anticipated surf conditions, meaning our water competitors only took part in State qualifiers for the Iron person and Board Rescue events on other days. Despite this setback, there were numerous other carnivals where our Nippers shone. A record nine members from the North Bondi competition squad won selection to represent the Sydney Interbranch team, demonstrating the strength of our Youth. The Sydney Branch successfully defended their title at the State Interbranch Championships.

The Club has recently placed a greater emphasis on transitioning our Nippers and Youth into the senior club. Over the past few years, we have introduced a variety of initiatives aimed at keeping our Youth engaged throughout their teenage years. I am pleased to report that one such initiative, the Cadet Patrol Program, has been immensely successful. I would like to extend a special thank you to the parents, particularly the former Age Managers, who have played a crucial role in driving this program. There is no doubt that their efforts have significantly contributed to our improved retention rates.

As part of our commitment to supporting our Youth, we have also reduced the patrol requirements for students preparing for their HSC. The usual 30-hour commitment has been halved to 15 hours. We hope this reduction helps our young members manage their studies while continuing to be active participants in the Club.

The September school holiday 'fast track' Bronze Medallion (BM) program has grown in popularity. An additional 30 cadets came through and qualified as BM holders. Huge thanks to the Education team lead by Erik Haggstrom, Andrew Millmore and Anna Willis. These three members have led this initiative for many years and sacrificed both work and family time to ensure young members qualify in a just few days, rather than the usual eight to ten weeks.

This season, North Bondi enjoyed its largest group of U14s to obtain their Surf Resuscitation Certificate (SRC) - 63 in total. It's a massive commitment and thanks must be extended to the Education Team of Erik Haggstrom, Andrew Millmore, Jonathon Golan, Karl Onslow, Rob Salmon, Mark Nathan, Cynthia Baker-Barden, Nick Sone, Kylie Biddle, Alex Goold, Michelle MacMahon, Alex Sommerville, Dave Weston, Steve Wales, Sarah Moritz, Di Leedham, Maya Golan and Scarlett Levy.

The extensive planning that went into dedicating the first five Sundays of the season to the SRC program should not be underestimated. The achievements were made even more special by having two of last year's SRC graduates, Maya Golan and Scarlett Levy, join the Education Team. Big congratulations and thank you to everyone involved for nurturing another batch of future lifesavers.

I want to make special mention of Scarlett Levy. She has been an exceptional Youth member since joining U13 Nippers. After obtaining her SRC, she quickly followed up with First Aid and ART accreditations. Scarlett is now a lead trainer for future SRC candidates and serves on the Sydney Branch Youth and Junior Development committees. Scarlett won the U15 Lifesaver of the Year at the Sydney Branch Awards of Excellence held in June.

Other nominees for the Sydney Branch Awards of Excellence included Jude Thorpe, Emerson Hoo, Bart Carmody, Mia Hoo, Lily Wenmohs, Noah Bowler and Lizzy Sommerville. Also nominated was our all-conquering U13 Boys Beach Relay for Team of the Year.

During the September school holidays, the Club organised a series of nipper clinics that saw 40 promising Nippers receive skills coaching by senior club competitors. Due to popular demand, additional clinics were also run before Christmas. The young kids loved hanging out and learning from the big kids. Open competitors Lexie Tait and Ned Wieland also ran specialised iron person and ocean swim sessions for our experienced senior nipper competitors.

Beach Report

The 2023/24 season will go down as one of the most successful seasons the North Bondi Beach Team enjoyed on the sand in a very long time.

During the early stages of our season, we were lucky to be joined by a fabulous bunch of U9 competitors who were super keen to develop and compete in the true club spirit. Our training program threw up some challenges along the way with numerous sessions at Cooper Park Stairs, Centennial Park Hills, ES Marks athletics track and of course North Bondi Beach. The work ethic during 'Hell Week' was outstanding with around 40 beachies (and parents) taking on one of the biggest challenges during this period – Wanda Sand Dunes.

On average we had 30 plus Nippers attend training this season (July to March). Our highest number of beachies at a single training session was 60 with a total of 77 training sessions conducted over the 8 months.

Our team competed at a number of smaller carnivals through the season including the Forster Weekend of Surf, Wanda One, Sydney Water Series, Beach Stormers, Junior Beach Carnivals at North Narrabeen, Queenscliff and Narrabeen and Manly Nipper NATS.

The Club was a strong force on the beach and competitive in most events. Congratulations to Amber Worden and Lilly Na'a who were selected to represent Sydney at Interbranch. Both girls were strong contributors in their selected events and achieved Gold medals in the U12 mixed beach relay and the female all age relay teams. Sydney Branch went on to win the overall Championship.

At Waverley Shield, North Bondi beachies dominated with an incredible result - 27 Gold, 21 Silver and 16 Bronze medals. All of our beachies team were amazing, competing in multiple events and in a lot of cases running up an age group to ensure other teammates could compete in beach relay events.

Unfortunately, water events were cancelled at Sydney Branch Championships at North Bondi but the competition continued for beach events. It became an opportunity for our beachies to show their stuff. Our beachies were outstanding with solid individual performances from James Worden, Emmeline Henrici and Harry Cairns, taking out Gold medals in their respective events. Both Jude Thorpe and Amber Worden were impressive, winning both the sprint and flag events in their repetitive age groups. Congratulations to beachies - Chloe Apperley, James-Dean Smit, Claudia White, Santiago Dalton, Clementine Finlayson, Katani Christopher, Patrick Gisz, Beau Cadet, Grace Obeid, Lilly Na'a, Jensen Lee, Sofia White and Roxanne Heng who all won an individual medal for their efforts. Our beach relay teams were dominant in every age group picking up a total of 11 out of 12 relay medals. Our team finished with an incredible 13 Gold, 8 Silver, 13 Bronze medals with North Bondi beach team winning the point score and named the Sydney Branch Champions for 2024. Congratulations to all beach team members.

The next challenge for our beachies was to take on the state's best at the NSW Age Surf Life Saving Championships at Queenscliff and North Steyne. Around 70 North Bondi beachies compete at state and for 18 athletes this was their first NSW championships. Our relays were outstanding with our teams winning medals in 15 out of 19 relay events and nine competitors took home an individual medal.

The Club was dominant in the U9 and U10 boys and girls relays – out of six relay events, the Club won five Gold and one Silver medal, the best ever performance from NB junior teams. Our U12 boys and girls 'A' teams continued their dominance on the beach winning Gold in their relays. The U13 boys continued their unbeaten record, winning Gold in five consecutive years. The U14 girls were

also amazing - each of the girls contributing to winning their Gold medal. Our club beachies won 27 medals - 11 Gold, 8 Silver, 8 Bronze.

Following the NSW Championships, 15 of our beach competitors competed at the Australian Youth Championships on the Sunshine Coast. Parker Jordan-Booth, James Onslow, Elizabeth Somerville, Grace Obeid, Chloe Dawson, Jensen Lee, Spencer Jordan-Booth, Joshua Raymond, Conner Colquhoun, Kristian Mackay, Sofia White, Mimi Tolnay, Addison Hughes, Lucia Hughes and Fia Cunningham.

Compliments to Jensen Lee and Elizabeth Somerville, both were in tremendous finishing 8th and 4th in their respective age group beach sprint final.

The NSW champions in the U13 boys relay team of Joshua Raymond, Spencer Jordan-Booth, Jensen Lee and Connor Colquhoun finished an incredible 6th position in the U13 and U14 boys beach sprint relay, while the U13 girls relay team of Fia Cunningham, Mimi Tolnay, Lucia Zagora and Addison Hughes were tremendous finishing 8th in the U13 and U14 girls beach relay final. Special mention Kristian Mackay who was impressive in the U13 boys beach flags and to our U14 girls beach relay team of Grace Obeid, Sofia White, Elizabeth Somerville and Chloe Dawson who put up a very competitive effort in their quest for Aussie Gold only to be denied in an unfortunate mishap. I'm sure the girls will be back bigger and better than ever next season.

A special thanks to Alexandra Sommerville, Bram Booth, Gill Worden, our Beach Captains Elizabeth Somerville, James Onslow and all our wonderful volunteers for their exceptional dedication to the team throughout the season, you all are AMAZING. The BSc Buckler to Bergs Ocean Swim took place on Sunday, December 10, 2023, and as usual, we encountered challenging conditions. In the 1km event it was Duke Wieland 1st and Dean Gladstone 3rd, and in the female category, Mia Hoo 1st, and Lucy Gladstone 2nd. In the 2km event Lachlan Warrener was the eventual winner with brothers Duke Wieland 2nd and Ned Wieland 3rd. In the Female 2km event it was an all-North Bondi affair with Lexie Tait the overall winner, Sophie Ferenczi 2nd and Vivi Hughes 3rd.

Special thanks to BSc for their support and making this event a memorable experience for all competitors in challenging conditions.

The Oceana Funds North Bondi Swim Classic was originally scheduled for Sunday, February 11, 2024. However, consistent with past experiences, treacherous surf conditions forced us to postpone the event. It was rescheduled for Sunday, April 7, 2024, a date more favourable for ocean swimmers. The new conditions offered a good wave at the finish, which ultimately distinguished the elite male swimmers on the podium, as all three had to run up the beach to reach the finish line.

The Club had over 1000 competitors registered across both events, with a good showing from all participants, despite the rescheduled date.

Club swimmers' presence on the podium this year was once again dominant with Ned Wieland winning the prized 2km male elite category and Lucy Gladstone taking out the female 2km elite category. Harrison Nixon won the male 1km category and Belinda Bullivant won the female 1km category.

We are delighted to have Oceana Funds supporting this swim event with their generous sponsorship.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the North Bondi SLSC community, from the office team, the registration team, the beach crew, water safety and the medical team in what was again an amazing team effort, as we continue to improve the competitor experience.

Club Activities

Sunday Surf Race

What a great season we had in 2023/24. There was lots of banter, and the favourite comment was "that can't be right, why is that person going off before me". I can assure everyone that the handicap system worked well. I can also say that the handicap system screen was the most looked at of any screens at the Club.

The Sunday Surf Races have become a popular event amongst so many members of the Club. The numbers have grown from last year and this year we had 46 swimmers in A-grade (last year 25), 64 in B-grade (last year 41) and a great turnout for C-grade of 38 (last year 23).

This season we put out permanent buoys so the course distance every week was the same except if it was high or low tide on the day. Again, the handicap system worked well because, as in previous years, the winners in two grades were only decided on the last day of racing.

A-grade was won by Head of Lifesaving Nick Sone who just had to turn up on the last day of racing and he was assured first place. He was one of the few that did not give the handicapper any grief, so his handicap was well looked after (only joking). There was fierce competition between Mike Galgut and April Campbell in the B-grade as they both surged ahead of the field. It came down to the last race of the season to decide who would win. was also an "A" grade swimmer, tennis and
football player. Ken is widely regarded as
North Bondi's greatest ever all-round athlete.

Following Ken's recognition, Brian "Cleo" Powell brought Tony "The Eyes" Hamilton and his wife, Sue to the front to "give them a wrap". Tony, one of our most dedicated administrators, has supported the Club behind the scenes for decades. We also highlighted that Tony and Sue, lead a family with three generations in our club which is a significant part of both our history and our future.

"A Decade in the Clubhouse"

"It's not easy to build a landmark - a remarkable building - an award-winning building - a building like nothing in the area. In fact, it is more like something that was washed up or came from the sea, with its glistening tiled facade and weathered rounded edges."

On Saturday, 23 September 2023, the Club hosted a cocktail party to honour the Building Committee and major donors who played significant roles in planning and constructing the new clubhouse. The event was not only a gesture of gratitude, but it was also an opportunity to recognise how the building has withstood the test of time.

The evening was a celebration of a decade in our 'new' home. Like any piece of art or sculpture, the building had its critics and it sparked interest when unveiled, and it's a fascination that continues to this day.

Finished in 2013, the Clubhouse was designed by Durbach Block Jaggers and remembers the understated heroism of our club's activities and the lifestyle associated with club and beach life.

The state-of-the-art clubhouse set a new benchmark for lifesaving facilities in Australia. It was designed to blend seamlessly with the coastal setting, and depending on the position of the sun, the white mosaic tiles that house the Clubs structure, still sparkle in the sun.

Special guests included eight Wally Weekes benefactors, each of whom donated over \$100,000, the architectural team from Durbach Block Jaggers and former club committee members were also invited. For those unfamiliar, Wally Weekes was a local swimmer and founded North Bondi Surf Life Saving Club in 1906.

Club President, Steve Larnach welcomed guests to the milestone event. Then, key project members, architect Neil Durbach, Club member and architect Peter Colquhoun, and Ben Griffiths, the former chairperson of the Committee who led the fundraising campaign, were invited to the stage to share memories of the project.

Finding the money to build the Clubhouse is a great story of persistence. As former Prime Minister, Malcolm Turnbull said at the opening back in 2013:

"John Howard's large grant in 2007 of \$1.7 million was cancelled by his successor. Most clubs would have dropped the project. But this one did not – of the \$7 million only \$1.7 million came from Governments - \$750,000 from Waverley Council, \$450,000 from the State Government and \$500,000 from the new Coalition Federal Government, pledged by me and Tony Abbott shortly after Tony had finished the city to surf.

The rest – \$5.3 million, more than 75% of the total funding, came from private donations.

This club is not the product of a government grant – it has been paid for by the generosity both in time and money of its members and its supporters."

Malcolm Turnbull, our inaugural Wally Weekes member, shared why he was one of the first to contribute to the project. He said the Club held a special place in his heart, recalling cherished moments from his childhood and Youth spent with his father Bruce, who started bringing him to this club in the mornings when he came down for a swim. Malcolm reflected on the privilege of being involved in the project and described the Clubhouse as an "ageless building that, much like the Sydney Opera House, transcends time." He said its enduring modernity and relevance, is just as impactful today as when it was first constructed.

The Club's Building Committee included Grant McMah, Ben Griffiths, Mark Cotter, Peter Zieme, Peter Strachan, Peter Carter, Mark Cotter and Peter Colquhoun. Unfortunately, Grant McMah couldn't attend and his wellknown tales of "getting it done" were greatly missed.

With just over 90 attending, there was plenty of time to catch up and reflect on the achievement by so many. It is still hard to believe we did the majority of fundraising during the global financial crisis and while not perfect, it is a long way from what we had and others still have.

The one big question, that remained unanswered on the night - what happened to the "Dill Magnet"?











Teddy Sime Memorial Watsons Bay Run

At least 160 Board riders formed a circle out in the water, their brightly coloured club shirts illuminated by the day's first light. Six victims were killed in the April 13th attacks at the nearby Bondi Junction Westfield shopping centre.

National Medal Recipients, Season 2023/24

North Bondi SLSC would like to congratulate Kiva Galgut and Rosemarie Taliano, who were awarded the National Medal in November 2023. National Medals are a prestigious award, part of the Australian honours system, recognising long and diligent service (15 or more years) by members who risk their lives or safety to protect or assist the community in times of emergency.



Kiva Galaut

Kiva is a dedicated lifesaver whose unwavering commitment to water safety and rescue operations has earned him national recognition and acclaim. With a relentless drive to protect lives along the coastline, he embodies the spirit of heroism and compassion.

His connection to the water runs deep, rooted in fond memories of his father, Raille, taking him surfing before he could even walk. These early experiences instilled in him a deep appreciation for the ocean and a sense of responsibility to protect beachgoers and swimmers.

Kiva joined the Club as a nipper in the early '90s, fostering an obsession with water, the beach and particularly Bondi. He earned his Bronze Medallion in 1999 and Silver Medallion Inflatable Rescue Boat (IRB) driver the following year. Following in his father's footsteps, Kiva set out to become an IRB Trainer in 2011, where he shared his knowledge and skills with the next generation of IRB drivers and crew.

Kiva's lifesaving journey has been marked by numerous achievements and accolades. With over 20 years of 100% patrol hour seasons (soon to be 25) at North Bondi and more than 10 years of seasons to count as a Support Operations RWC driver, he is well-deserved to be awarded his 15-year National Medal.

In addition to his frontline duties, Kiva has excelled in competitive lifesaving, showcasing his prowess and sportsmanship in various disciplines, both in the water and on the sand. His return to competition around 2013

after a ten-year hiatus was met with success, underscoring his enduring passion for the sport and his commitment to fitness, continual growth and personal development.

As captain of the RWC (jet ski) from 2020 to 2023, Kiva played a pivotal role in advancing support operations and enhancing the effectiveness of rescue missions. His leadership and innovation are further evident in his involvement with the UAV (drone) pilot program since 2019, leveraging cutting-edge technology to improve lifesaving capabilities.

As if that's not enough, Kiva attained his Gold Medallion in 2011 and has managed to continually re-attain this award annually, completing his latest Gold proficiency earlier this season. He's not sure what the record is for continuous Gold proficiencies in a row, however whatever it is, he hopes to break it.

Kiva's dedication and passion for North Bondi Surf Life Saving Club are hard to match and there are sure to be many more years of service.

Rosemarie Taliano



Rosie first joined North Bondi Surf Club at the age of 5 years old in 1997 where she begun Nippers in the U6 age category.

Once Rosie completed Nippers, she went on to gain her Surf Rescue Certificate straight after, and continued on to gain her Bronze Medallion in 2008.

From here, Rosie began patrolling as a member, whilst also gaining further awards such as Senior First Aid, Pain Management Certificate, Silver Medallion Aquatic Rescue, Silver Medallion Beach Management, Spinal Management, Certificate IV in Training and Assessment and UAV Operator for Sydney Branch. Rosie has also travelled around Australia conducting patrols at various beaches including Byron Bay SLSC, Bonny Hills SLSC and Fremantle SLSC.

In the 2011/2012 season, she was promoted as a Vice Captain for Patrol 12, and continued her leadership pathway in becoming Patrol Captain in 2015. To this day, Rosie still continues to patrol in her original team as a Patrol Captain.

Rosie has been actively involved in Education at the Club since 2010, and this involvement has only increased over the years. With Rosie's educational background as a Primary School Teacher and current Trainer/Facilitator for Qantas Airways, she has always used her passion, skills and experience for teaching to ensure that training is always engaging for her learners. She gained her Bronze Medallion Training Officer at the age of 19 and continued on to be an accredited Assessor at the age of 22. Rosie's contribution to education has led her to train and assess multiple SRC and Bronze training groups over the years and she has mentored many young surf lifesavers.

Rosie joined SLS Support Operations and began patrolling on Surf Rescue 30 (based in Malabar) in 2013. In 2014 she obtained her Offshore Crew Members Award and continued on to gain her Offshore Rescue Boat Drivers Award in 2015. Since joining, she has contributed to more than 560 hours on the boat, along with multiple callouts and rescues which have included overturned boats/jet-skis, swimmers in distress and missing persons.

In competition, Rosie has long represented North Bondi in multiple events at both Branch, NSW State and National level, competing in Champion Life Saver events, Ocean Swim events and March Past. Rosie has received 3 Gold Medals and 1 Silver Medal at the Australian Titles, as well as multiple Gold, Bronze and Silver medals from Branch and State carnivals.

Rosie's contribution to Surf Life Saving has also seen her attain many notable awards and achievements for Club, Branch, NSW and Australia, including;

- North Bondi Lady Berryman Award for Most Outstanding Junior (2009/10 & 2010/11)
- North Bondi Patrol of the Year (2012/13)
- SLSS Branch U21 Surf Life Saver of the Year (2013)
- Waverley Young Local Hero 2014
- SLSS Branch U19 Surf Life Saver of the Year (2009/10 & 2011/12)
- SLSS Volunteer of the Year (2010/11)
- SLSS Branch Surf Life Saver of the Year in 2014/15
- NSW Surf Life Saver of the Year in 2014/2015
- Surf Rescue 30 Crew Member of the Year in 2014/15

Rosie has also attended, mentored and facilitated at many Surf Life Saving Programs which have included; NSW Surf Life Saving Exchange Program in 2013, NSW 18-25 years Development Program in 2015, SLSNSW Beach-Bush Presenter, National Leadership College in 2016, SLSA Women's Mentoring Program in 2021. Rosie also had the opportunity to travel to Japan in 2019 to represent SLSA where she was tasked in lifeguarding and educating surf lifesaving members of Onjuku Surf Club.

Rosie also currently sits on the Award Panel Committee for SLSA Club of the Year and has been involved in assessing these awards for 5 years.





Peter Agnew AM

Peter was recognised in the King's Birthday Honours list this year, awarded the Member of the Order of Australia (AM) for significant service to Surf Life Saving. Peter joined North Bondi in the early 1980s and was a highly active lifesaver for over 20 years. He would go on to become one of surf life saving's most committed and influential lifesavers undertaking service within club IRB operations, Jet Rescue and Offshore Rescue Boat services along with RWC, radio control room, and emergency service coordination. Peter has also made a big contribution to education for many years as a trainer, assessor, and facilitator.

Peter has served in Club, Branch, State, and National senior leadership roles. In addition, he has assisted in shaping Surf Life Saving through the transformation of education accreditation, nationalising information technology, and moving the organisation from a community and sporting organisation into the emergency services domain. Peter has held many roles including Club Captain, Branch President, and National General Manager at SLSA while also completing committee work with the International Lifesaving Federation. He is currently a Board member at SLSA, and Chair and President of SLSNSW.

The Club congratulates Peter on this well-deserved honour.





Gianna Taranto - from the shores of Bondi to the shores of Somalia

In mid-2022, North Bondi member Gianni Taranto made the decision to trade in his Bondi lifestyle for one in Mogadishu, the capital of Somalia, to work for the United Nations World Food Program (WFP). As the world's largest humanitarian agency, WFP is responsible for providing lifesaving food assistance to crisisaffected populations, while also working with vulnerable communities and Governments around the world on long-term interventions that will improve food security. Somalia is facing increasingly severe climate shocks experiencing its worst drought in 40 years in 2022, followed by the worst flood season in a century in 2023 – while also enduring ongoing conflict and terrorism which together create widespread hunger, displacement and poverty. WFP is a lifeline to millions in these circumstances. For example, in Gianni's current role he is leading efforts to provide

meals to 100,000 school children across the country every day in an effort to keep children in school in spite of the country's challenges.

When asked about his new life, Gianni says it is not as different as one might think, "I used to live near the beach in Bondi, and now I live near the beach in Mogadishu. And although I can no longer go for a Sunday arvo schooner at the surf club, I can have a sundowner at a nearby military base overlooking the ocean." He says jokingly, "So, there isn't much difference between Bondi and Mogadishu... except maybe seeing a few more AK47s and having to wear a bulletproof vest on the journey home from the beach!"

When he isn't flying around the country in UN planes and helicopters, Gianni is staying in touch with his surf lifesaving skills by teaching several of his work colleagues to swim in their compound's newly installed pool. Many of the colleagues, who hail from all over the world – places like Kenya, Ghana, Nepal, India and Nigeria - have horrific previous experiences with water. Some have witnessed their best friends drowning in flash floods, nearly drowned themselves when falling into shallow wells as children or heard stories of community members being killed by hippos when going for a swim in a lake near their homes. As a result, it has been a long journey for them to feel comfortable in the water. But now, in a mere few months, they are able to swim up and down without requiring supervision. He describes it as, "a super rewarding way to spend some of my downtime. Swimming is such an important life skill and who knows, maybe one day my efforts here could prevent a future rescue at Bondi, or elsewhere."

North Bondi's Paris 2024 Olympians

North Bondi has not one, but two members competing at the 2024 Olympic Games, and we are looking forward to cheering them on as they compete in Paris.



Noah Havard - Men's K4 500M Canoe Sprint Noah Havard joined North Bondi in 2009 as an U9 Nipper. He moved through the Club. obtaining his Bronze Medallion in 2015, and remains an Active patrolling member to this day. Noah first learnt to paddle a surf ski on the shores of North Bondi beach and at the Mighty Cooks River, and became heavily involved in North Bondi's surf sports program as both a Youth and Open athlete. He has won a number of Australian Titles under the North Bondi cap, including Gold in the U17 male single ski (2018), U17 ski relay (2018), U17 men's Taplin (2018), U19 men's double ski (2018), U19 men's ski relay (2018), Open Men's Taplin (2021) plus several other Silver and Bronze medals - including a Silver in the Open Male single ski (2023).





Whilst spending a few months of COVID across the border in Queensland in 2021, Noah took up the opportunity to train with the Australian kayak squad. Noah showed promise, and later that year fully committed to the Olympic dream and relocated to Queensland to train full time with the Australian kayak team. In 2022 Noah was selected in the Australian Senior Sprint Kayak Team, and has since medalled in several events at various kayaking World Cups. The majority of his time has been spent in the K4 with fellow surf lifesavers Riley Fitzsimmons (Northcliffe), Pierre van der Westhuyzen (Mermaid Beach) and Jackson Collins (Kurrawa - however formerly a North Bondi member, and winner of two Open Men's single ski Australian titles representing North Bondi and also a member of North Bondi's 2021 Gold medal winning Open Male Taplin team). This K4 crew achieved a Silver medal at the 2023 World Cup in Poland, and again at the 2024 World Cup in Hungary.

In March 2024 Noah and his crew formally qualified for the Paris 2024 Olympic Games, where they will contest the men's K4 500M Canoe Sprint event.



Bronte Campbell - Women's 4 x 100m Freestyle Relay

Bronte Campbell joined North Bondi in January 2022, whilst taking a break from swimming following the Toyko Olympic Games. Bronte is already a household name to many, having competed in the 2012, 2016 and 2021 Olympics - with two Olympic Gold medals in the 4x100m freestyle relay to her name, and a Bronze medal in the 4x100m mixed medley relay.

Bronte completed her Bronze in the BM1 group of 2022, and was an integral part of this squad, providing support, encouragement and camaraderie to the rest of the group - all in spite of her superior swimming ability. She pulled on a North Bondi competition cap at Aussies 2022, having a crack at the belt swim

in some fairly tough conditions. This season she made her Stan Mac debut, clocking a respectable time of 5 minutes and 10 seconds. Transitioning from pool swimming to surf swimming is not as easy as it may sound, and North Bondi is so fortunate to have Bronte, who has been willing to give surf swimming a go.

After 18 months out of the pool, Bronte returned to swimming in a bid to qualify for her fourth Olympic Games. This involved spending three out of every four weeks in Canberra with her training squad, and every fourth week back at her home in Bondi. Despite this rigorous training schedule, Bronte still manages to make it down to patrol.

At the Australian Swimming Trials in June 2024, Bronte qualified for her fourth Olympics - swimming the fourth-fastest time in the women's 100m freestyle and earning herself a spot in the 4x100m freestyle relay for the third time.

It's been a long while since North Bondi has been able to cheer on its members at the Olympic Games. North Bondi was last represented on an Olympic team by Igor Praporshchikov, who competed in wrestling at the 2000 Games, and by Jim Walker and Rebecca Joyce, who competed in kayaking and rowing respectively in the 1996 Games. The Olympic dream has now come full circle at North Bondi, with Jim Walker being Noah Havard's first and only surf ski coach.

North Bondi is so proud of Noah and Bronte and what they have achieved, and we cannot wait to watch them do North Bondi (and Australia!) proud on the world stage.

Nick McNamara - English Channel Swim

On the 16th of September 2024, my allocated window to swim the English Channel will open. I will be attempting a solo, unassisted swim, navigating the notorious tides to cross the 35km strait. I've swum over 1000km in the last 12 months to put myself in the best possible situation to succeed. It's been a combination of endurance training and cold-water exposure to prepare myself for the elements of the busiest shipping lane in the world.

Why did I start?

Many begin training with a specific cause in mind. It gives them a purpose and something to fall back on during tough training blocks. Others are motivated by grief, swimming in memory of a loved one. And as always with endurance events, there's a specific group that are talented enough to set records and keep pushing the limits.

For me, the motivation to start was internal. To set ambitious goals and get more out of myself. The last 12 months have taught me a lot about self-discipline, resilience, and of course perseverance. These are traits I hope to carry beyond my Channel swim.

But what put the thought in my mind? Our environment shapes who we are. And when I look around this club, I see people pushing themselves every single day. Whether it's Ned crossing the bay 62 times, or James, Louis, Rob, and Sam rowing across the Atlantic or even the competition athletes getting ready for their races each week. The members of this club never settle for mediocrity. All ages, at all levels, push themselves. We punch above our weight. I have no doubt being exposed to this attitude has rubbed off on me.

Why will I finish?

The support I have received within the Club has been humbling. People constantly checking in, giving me recovery tips, and telling me where the coldest swimming spots are in Sydney. I've also had many members ask if I'm raising money. I've felt guilty saying no, turning away money that could be directed to a good cause.

I was recently made aware of the great work our North Bondi RSL sub-branch does (not to be confused with the SLS club). This is one of the largest sub-branches in the country, and it wraps its arms around our veterans and their families as they transition back into civilian life. Our club connects us with our community, to think about others and to give something back. I couldn't think of a more worthy cause to raise some money. If you feel inclined, you can donate to North Bondi RSL.

So, when I swim, I will do so with our community in my mind, the spirit of a proud club in my heart and a black pair of North Bondi swimmers on my bum.



Ian Pike - Supreme Court Judge

Since February of 2024, Ian is more properly named as The Honourable Justice Ian Pike, having been appointed to the Supreme Court of New South Wales. I know him well and I know he would prefer that he be addressed as simply 'lan' as he is a modest person.

I have known the Pike family since 1958 when I joined North Bondi. lan's father Fred was a member of the Club executive, serving as Treasurer for many years and was elected as a Life Member. Fred and his brother Les joined Nth Bondi after returning from military service in 1945.

There are three Pike 'boys' – Stephen (the eldest), and the twins Ian and Andrew, the 'Pikelets', who became members in the very early 1980s. They joined as cadets, obtaining their Bronze Medallions in 1982. Thereafter all the boys became model members. The twins both became Active Reserve Members.

With the guidance of their parents Ian and Andrew did particularly well at school, allowing them entry into the University course of their choice. Ian chose Accountancy at Sydney University while Andrew chose Economics at UNSW. In due course, they both transferred to Law where they both excelled, graduating with Honours. Ian became an associate at a large Sydney firm of solicitors, (Mallesons Stephen Jaques) while Andrew became Managing Partner of an equally large firm with international reach (Herbert Smith Freehills).

In 1997, Ian went to the Bar and joined the Eleventh Floor of Wentworth Chambers, which had many of the Bar's leaders. I had been a member of that floor since 1973 and was pleased to welcome a fellow 'Clubby' as a floor member. Also pleased to welcome Ian was the Floor Clerk, Paul Daley OAM (a member of Queenscliff SLSC) who was developing a reputation as a 'King maker' due to his astute input into Floor selections. Recently, the Floor celebrated the unique achievement of having the present Chief Justices of Australia and New South Wales as past members.

lan Pike joins an Illustrious group. As a barrister, became a Senior Counsel and developed a reputation as an advocate and an excellent legal writer. He was encouraged to join the Supreme Court bench by his good friend Chief Justice Andrew Bell and eventually agreed.

lan and Andrew Pike have been substantial donors to the Club and Ian has represented the Club in litigation for no fee. Before his appointment he also sat as a member of the Judiciary Committee, displaying a level-headed approach to some quite difficult matters.

The Surf Boys (now Nippers) were formed in 1967. Paul joined 1968 so he was one of the originals and did his Bronze in 1976.

He was a member of the NSW Fire Service

and obtained the rank of Station Officer.

Paul carried out all his duties as a North Bondi member and was always a willing worker at Ocean Swim days and the like. He was one of the fittest for his age and will be sadly missed around the Club.



John Nurmi -70 Year Member & Life Member

John did his Bronze in 1952 and was Vice Captain for 5 years in the early 1960's. Heavily involved in the Beach Football days as a player, coach and referee (very

fairly) which was a big event in those days.

As a Chartered Accountant he was the Honorary Auditor of the Club for some years, providing exceptional service to the Club. John was also a great financial advisor to fellow Clubs such as the Bondi Icebergs (also a Life Member) and Bondi United RLFC.



Peter Pontefract -70 Year Member

Peter gained his Bronze in the 1947/48 season and although he moved to Mollymook in the late 1950's, he always maintained his membership and rarely missed

He was a good allrounder in swimming events, surf boats and won a Gold Medal in the 1949 March Past Team. Along with 8 others, he toured Northwest Tasmania competing with local Clubs in Beach and Swimming Events.



James Power -70 Year Member

"Jimmy Shirts" originally joined Bondi Bathers for a short period before coming to North Bondi in the late 1940's to race the 16-foot surfBoards of the day with the likes of Spaz Hurst,

Soup Sawyer, Ray Young and Bruce Agnew. Jim contributed to all Club Functions and was a founder of the 'Coffee Club' with Ron Hiscoe, Chas Christensen, Fred Mayer and others which gave much joy to many over the years.



Neil Rogers - Long Service Member

Neil was a champion swimmer and coach. He won an Australian Open Belt Championship in 1976 with the Clovelly Club.

He was a dual Olympian competing at the Munich

Games in 1972 and at the Montreal Games in 1976 in the butterfly stroke. Neil also competed in two Commonwealth Games in 1970 and 1974, winning Gold in the 100 butterfly in a Games Record in 1974.

Neil enjoyed commentating at Ocean Swims and was an invaluable help to North Bondi and other Clubs for a long period of time. He loved to coach swimmers and loved swimming and will be greatly missed in the Bondi community.



Edwin Sime -60 Year Member

Ted joined the Club in 1957. He was and excellent swimmer and won a Silver Medal in the Junior Rescue & Resuscitation at the Australian Championships in 1959.

He could only be described as a super athlete be it in the Beach Football days or the Watsons Bay or Maroubra runs where he was unbeatable. He passed away doing what he loved best, swimming the bay which he did almost every day.




























Functions



Operations

I mentioned in my last report in 2023 that we have been in the building for 10 years already. Well in the 11th year, the building has undergone lots of maintenance to keep it in the condition it is today. I am not sure that members realise that the upkeep takes a lot of effort and that we need to invest to keep the premises in its present state.

Although maintenance costs have increased as the building gets older, we are still in great shape. This is because we are very proactive rather than reactive in making sure things remain in good repair. The building is open to very unfavourable and sometimes extreme weather conditions which makes it very vulnerable to things going wrong. This is evident as the front doors and side doors need constant fixing. When the wind blows hard, we have to make the decision to close the doors to member access as the rollers and brackets have broken in the past.

Since last year we have been busy with trying to finalise the changeroom design and costings. I am very confident that we are now almost at the stage where we are ready to show members what we have prepared so far. The stalling factor is that we are in the throes of trying to finalise our lease of the premises which has a huge impact on what design we can go forward with. This also has a huge impact on the costing of the project. As I mentioned the lease is taking up a lot of time and we are not sure when this will be finalised. Not knowing the outcome of the lease negotiations has had an impact on the building grant application as well. All these these upgrades can proceed. As soon as we know, we will schedule a meeting to discuss with members the forward changeroom plans.

We have now built our ARLF flood barriers. We completed the work ourselves and saved the Club a substantial amount of money. However,

factors have pushed back our timing on when

we have not had the opportunity to test the barriers as the conditions have remained favourable in the last 12 months.

Maintenance of the building is a never-ending job. We need to keep on top of things and as the building gets older there will always be an increase in spending to keep the building functioning efficiently. One of the main issues is to keep the building security as tight as possible as we have had a few break-ins and people sleeping on the premises. This has now been addressed with automatic doors being installed in the Youth Room. Fire alarms sometimes go off at odd times in the evening and these need to be attended to. Our caretaker, Glen Annear, has always attended to these issues and he makes sure every day that the Club is securely closed and constantly stays on top of maintenance issues.

Operations is a huge responsibility, and I cannot thank the team enough for all the help that goes into making this area run so smoothly. I would also like to thank the Board for their support as I am constantly asking for funds to fix things.

Please remember that this is our club and that looking after our biggest asset is so important as without a functioning building, the Club would be a different place. It's our Club so let's make it a wonderful place to keep coming down to and mixing with other members in this wonderful building.

Administration

The Administration Portfolio is probably regarded as the 'dullest' of the Board of Management portfolios, with this report buried in the back pages of the Club's Annual Report, falling far behind the excitement and energy of our many on-beach activities. For the very few readers that don't simply skip over this page, I'll do my best to document the potentially dull-but-very-necessary administrative happenings of season 2023/24.

With a significant turnover in Board members at the 2023 AGM, one of the first actions of the new BOM was to put a call out to all members to fill the various volunteer Officer and sub-committee roles across all sections. This proved successful, with 'newblood' putting their hands up for various roles, which set the Club up well for the season ahead. Specifically, the following roles fall within the admin portfolio: IT/ Website/Data Security Officer, Public Officer, Complaints Manager, Member Information Protection Officers, Government Liaison (Grants) Officer, Membership Committee, Risk Committee, D&I Committee, Child Safe Coordinator and Merchandise Committee. The roles of the majority of these Officers and sub-committees are self-explanatory, and I would like to thank each and every one of the members (whose names are listed elsewhere in this report) for their contributions to this portfolio in 2023/24.

With communications having been a noted area for improvement across the Club, the start of season also saw the production and circulation of a revamped Members Handbook for 2023/24, updates to the eNews formatting and content, and increased social media (Instagram and Facebook) activity. We also saw the eNews revert to weekly editions in-season, as we aimed to reduce ad-hoc emails to members. We hope that these initiatives - in addition to the weekly Bluey's Bulletin delivered on a Sunday afternoon have provided a stepwise improvement in the Club communications experience. I anticipate that communications will remain a focus area for the 2024/25 season that we can continue to make improvements in.

A large part of the admin portfolio requires staying on top of the various compliance and insurance requirements that arise or impact us as a surf club. This ranges from SLSA/SLSNSW compliance matters, directors' liability and indemnity insurance, biathlon and special events insurance, food safety standards compliance and liquor



licensing compliance - all of which are very different matters, and all come with associated and lengthy documentation that needs to be read, digested and then have various actions implemented. There is also a very real need to stay on top of our child safety requirements, and this past season has allowed us to have dialogue with both SLSNSW and SLSA regarding the SLSA Child Safe Policy and the practical implementation of child safe measures within our club, and SLS clubs as a whole.

A significant project this season was the review of the lease agreement between the Club and Waverley Council. We are fortunate to be granted twenty-year lease terms for our building - however the expiration of a twenty-year lease is significant, and negotiating a lease that needs to serve us and be 'future proofed' for the next twenty years is no small task - particularly when the lease governs which parties will be responsible for the upkeep of the building for the next two decades. The negotiation of this lease is still ongoing and progressing amicably with Waverley Council. We look forward to the signing of a new lease in the new season, and I would like to thank all of our Trustees for their significant contributions to this project.

Another key project that was undertaken this season was a thorough review of the Club Constitution. Amendments were put to the membership with the intent of updating the Constitution to reflect current-day practices within the Club and ensuring alignment to current SLSA policy. I would like to acknowledge both Andrew Christopher and Rob White, who put considerable effort into the drafting of these amendments. Unfortunately, these amendments did not achieve the 75% majority vote at a General

Meeting required to pass. The Board will be seeking further feedback from the membership with a view to put forward critical amendments once again in due course.

Our club of over 2000 members requires a small army of staff to keep it running, led by our General Manager, Julien Palmer. This past season has seen a number of staff depart for pastures new, and a number of enthusiastic individuals join our ranks. I would also like to thank all past and present staff for their contributions made this season, and their enthusiasm and willingness to serve the

On top of the 'big ticket' projects and items referred to above, the day-to-day of the admin portfolio also involves providing and communicating BOM directives to staff, resolving various minor membership matters, responding to member queries, and overseeing complaints matters. There is also the drafting of content for the eNews and social media, as well as collating required documentation and information for each BOM meeting and ensuring that all BOM meetings run smoothly and BOM minutes are published on the website. There is definitely something new to do every day, which has made for a very busy season.

In closing, I would like to thank my fellow BOM members for the support they have provided me this season - it has been a pleasure to work with you all. Additionally, I would like to specifically thank Yoni Golan and Katherine Cole for the support and guidance they have provided across a range of matters this past year. I wish all members a happy and successful 2024/25 season.

Finance Report

The detailed audited financials and associated notes are included in this report. We have also provided a non-audited summary of the Club's finances in a format that reflects the structure of the club and how it is managed.

These comments should be read with reference to the Summary Segmental Profit or Loss set out herein.

The Board advises that the club has delivered a surplus before depreciation of \$476,319 for the 2023/24 financial year. This compares to a surplus last year of \$716,363. The surplus after depreciation is \$100,785 compared to a surplus of \$371,343 in the prior year.

Revenues: Total Revenues were \$2,563,327, down from \$2,838,053 in the prior year with a reduction in donations, membership fees, merchandise sales, BBQ sales (due to inclement weather) sponsorship, and functions. Whilst there was a modest increase in revenue from grants, nipper activities, surf sports, member events and interest and investment distributions.

Expenses: Total Expenses before depreciation were \$2,087,007, down marginally on last year despite a significant increase in maintenance costs, member events and employee benefits.

There was a nearly \$76,000 increase in Facilities expenses on higher repairs and maintenance, cleaning, and wages costs. Cost of sales was down significantly for a couple of reasons, firstly a lower number of functions and secondly due to a change of stock management for merchandise. Office employee benefits and expenses were up compared to last year due to some one-off events and increased office hours. Given the lower level of revenue from functions there was also a significant reduction in function expenses for the year, with these down almost \$179,000. With an increased focus on member events for the year, expenses in this area were up almost \$63,000 compared to the previous period. Lifesaving expenses were up nearly \$7,700 primarily due to an increase in first aid costs. Youth/Nippers expenses were up on expanded activities and higher uniform costs. Surf Sports expenses were up due to Summer of Surf prize money despite lower costs of logistics and coaching fees. Expenses across the club were in general higher this year with water, gas and electricity all increasing significantly.

Capital Expenditure: During the period capital expenditure totaled almost \$211,000. There was a capital expenditure of circa \$98,000 on building improvements including



nearly \$30,000 on the ARLF flood barriers with expenditure of circa \$20,500 on club equipment and furniture. Lifesaving equipment including a new ATV, IRB trailer and motor totaled over \$35,500 and surf sports equipment including a new surf boat and several new boards totalled \$46,700.

Cash and Managed Funds Position: There is a total cash and managed fund investment balance of \$2,372,927 at year-end. This is an increase of \$62,376 on last year's closing balance for cash and other investments of \$2,310,551. This increase comprises a current-year operating surplus after accrual adjustments of \$273,347 and after deducting \$210,971 in capital expenditure.

Non-Cash Investments: As advised to members last year, we initiated our program of investing a portion of our surplus funds in diversified liquid non-cash investments. We are doing this through investment in managed funds via the Netwealth Platform. This process is overseen by the Investment Committee. At year-end, such funds totalled \$1,719,744 as noted above.

I would like to thank the Finance Committee for their hard work and expert guidance during the year and throughout my term. The FINCOM comprising Ben Griffiths, Daniel Ekins, Leonie Wilkinson, Katie Hilliard and Elise McKay have been instrumental in driving the Club's improved financial reporting and expense approval processes.

The financial statements cover North Bondi Surf Life Saving Club Inc. (the "Association") as a not-for-profit individual entity domiciled in Australia.

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

1 Basis of Preparation

In the opinion of Committee Members, North Bondi Surf Life Saving Club Inc is not a reporting entity since there are unlikely to exist users of the financial statements who are not able to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy all of their information needs. These special purpose financial statements have been prepared to meet the reporting requirements of the Board, the requirements of the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 and Australian Charities and Not-for-profit Commission Act 2012 and the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2009.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards and Accounting Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements, AASB 107 Statement of Cash Flows, AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors, AASB 1048 Interpretation of Standards and AASB 1054 Australian Additional Disclosures.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and are consistent with prior reporting periods unless otherwise stated.

2 Summary of Material Accounting Policies

(a) Revenue and other income

Revenue from contracts with customers

The core principle of AASB 15 is that revenue is recognised on a basis that reflects the transfer of promised goods or services to customers at an amount that reflects the consideration the Association expects to receive in exchange for those goods or services. Revenue is recognised by applying a five-step model as follows:

- 1. Identify the contract with the customer
- 2. Identify the performance obligations
- 3. Determine the transaction price
- 4. Allocate the transaction price to the performance obligations
- 5. Recognise revenue as and when control of the performance obligations is transferred

Generally the timing of the payment for sale of goods and rendering of services corresponds closely to the timing of satisfaction of the performance obligations, however where there is a difference, it will result in the recognition of a receivable, contract asset or contract liability.

None of the revenue streams of the Association have any significant financing terms as there is less than 12 months between receipt of funds and satisfaction of performance obligations.

(a) Revenue and other income

Specific revenue streams

The revenue recognition policies for the principal revenue streams of the Association are:

Donations and Bequests

Donations and bequests collected, including cash and goods for resale, are recognised as revenue when the Association gains control of the asset.

Grant revenue

Where grant income arises from an agreement which is enforceable and contains sufficiently specific performance obligations then the revenue is recognised when control of each performance obligations is satisfied.

Each performance obligation is considered to ensure that the revenue recognition reflects the transfer of control and within grant agreements there may be some performance obligations where control transfers at a point in time and others which have continuous transfer of control over the life of the contract.

Where control is transferred over time, generally the input methods being either costs or time incurred are deemed to be the most appropriate methods to reflect the transfer of benefit.

Membership subscription income

Membership subscription income is recognised over the period in which the services are rendered and corresponds to the satisfaction of performance obligations and transfer of control to the customer.

Amounts received in advance are recognised as deferred income and credited to profit and loss on a straight line basis over the expected subscription period.

(b) Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the Association is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997. The income tax exemption has been claimed based on self-assessment by the Association.

(c) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenue, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payable are stated inclusive of GST.

Cash flows in the statement of cash flows are included on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows.

(d) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost of inventory is determined using the first-in-first-out basis and is net of any rebates and discounts received. Net realisable value is estimated using the most reliable evidence available at the reporting date and inventory is written down through an obsolescence provision if necessary.

(e) Property, plant and equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost less where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.

Depreciation

Property, plant and equipment, excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight-line or diminishing value basis over the assets useful life to the Association, commencing when the asset is ready for use.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable asset are shown below:

Fixed asset class	Depreciation rate
Leasehold improvements	2.5% SL
Furniture & gym equipment	15 - 40% DV
Coaster bus	15 - 40% DV
Office furniture & equipment	15 - 40% DV
Surf sports & life saving equipment	15 - 30% DV

At the end of each annual reporting period, the depreciation method, useful life and residual value of each asset is reviewed. Any revisions are accounted for prospectively as a change in estimate.

(f) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

(g) Trade and other payables

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the Association during the reporting period which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of the recognition of the liability.

(h) Trade and other receivables

Trade receivables are recognised at fair value less any expected credit losses.

The Association has applied the simplified approach to measuring expected credit losses, which uses a lifetime expected loss allowance. To measure the expected credit losses, trade receivables have been grouped based on days overdue.

(i) Financial instruments

Financial instruments are recognised initially on the date that the Association becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

On initial recognition, all financial instruments are measured at fair value plus transaction costs (except for instruments measured at fair value through profit or loss where transaction costs are expensed as incurred).

Financial assets

All recognised financial assets are subsequently measured in their entirety at either amortised cost or fair value, depending on the classification of the financial assets.

Classification

On initial recognition, the Association classifies its financial assets into the following categories, those measured at:

amortised cost

Financial assets are not reclassified subsequent to their initial recognition unless the Association changes its business model for managing financial assets.

Amortised cost

Assets measured at amortised cost are financial assets where:

- the business model is to hold assets to collect contractual cash flows; and
- the contractual terms give rise on specified dates to cash flows are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

The Association's financial assets measured at amortised cost comprise trade and other receivables and cash and cash equivalents in the statement of financial position.

Subsequent to initial recognition, these assets are carried at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method less provision for impairment.

Interest income, foreign exchange gains or losses and impairment are recognised in profit or loss. Gain or loss on derecognition is recognised in profit or loss.

(i) Financial instruments

Financial assets

Impairment of financial assets

Impairment of financial assets is recognised on an expected credit loss (ECL) basis for the following assets:

financial assets measured at amortised cost

When determining whether the credit risk of a financial assets has increased significant since initial recognition and when estimating ECL, the Association considers reasonable and supportable information that is relevant and available without undue cost or effort. This includes both quantitative and qualitative information and analysis based on the Association's historical experience and informed credit assessment and including forward looking information.

The Association uses the presumption that a financial asset is in default when:

• the other party is unlikely to pay its credit obligations to the Association in full, without recourse to the Association to actions such as realising security (if any is held); or

Credit losses are measured as the present value of the difference between the cash flows due to the Association in accordance with the contract and the cash flows expected to be received. This is applied using a probability weighted approach.

Trade receivables

Impairment of trade receivables have been determined using the simplified approach in AASB 9 which uses an estimation of lifetime expected credit losses. The Association has determined the probability of non-payment of the receivable and multiplied this by the amount of the expected loss arising from default.

The amount of the impairment is recorded in a separate allowance account with the loss being recognised in finance expense. Once the receivable is determined to be uncollectable then the gross carrying amount is written off against the associated allowance.

Where the Association renegotiates the terms of trade receivables due from certain customers, the new expected cash flows are discounted at the original effective interest rate and any resulting difference to the carrying value is recognised in profit or loss.

Other financial assets measured at amortised cost

Impairment of other financial assets measured at amortised cost are determined using the expected credit loss model in AASB 9. On initial recognition of the asset, an estimate of the expected credit losses for the next 12 months is recognised. Where the asset has experienced significant increase in credit risk then the lifetime losses are estimated and recognised.

(j) Impairment of assets

At the end of each reporting period the Association determines whether there is an evidence of an impairment indicator for non-financial assets.

Where assets do not operate independently of other assets, the recoverable amount of the relevant cashgenerating unit (CGU) is estimated.

The recoverable amount of an asset or CGU is the higher of the fair value less costs of disposal and the value in use. Value in use is the present value of the future cash flows expected to be derived from an asset or cash-generating unit.

Where the recoverable amount is less than the carrying amount, an impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss. Reversal indicators are considered in subsequent periods for all assets which have suffered an impairment loss.

3 Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments

The directors make estimates and judgements during the preparation of these financial statements regarding assumptions about current and future events affecting transactions and balances.

These estimates and judgements are based on the best information available at the time of preparing the financial statements, however as additional information is known then the actual results may differ from the estimates.

The significant estimates and judgements made have been described below.

Key estimates - impairment of property, plant and equipment

The Association assesses impairment at the end of each reporting period by evaluating conditions specific to the Association that may be indicative of impairment triggers. Recoverable amounts of relevant assets are reassessed using value-in-use calculations which incorporate various key assumptions.

Key estimates - fair value of financial instruments

The Association has certain financial assets and liabilities which are measured at fair value. Where fair value has not able to be determined based on quoted price, a valuation model has been used. The inputs to these models are observable, where possible, however these techniques involve significant estimates and therefore fair value of the instruments could be affected by changes in these assumptions and inputs.

Key estimates - receivables

The receivables at reporting date have been reviewed to determine whether there is any objective evidence that any of the receivables are impaired. An impairment provision is included for any receivable where the entire balance is not considered collectible. The impairment provision is based on the best information at the reporting date.

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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

Report on the Audit of the Financial Report

Opinion

We have audited the financial report of North Bondi Surf Life Saving Club Inc. 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












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
